

My name is Bryan Scott and I'm honored to be your 2023 WSBC President. I have been involved in state and local bar activities in Nevada, in one form or another, for most of my 31-year legal career. During those years, I have seen and experienced many changes in our profession and I continue to see changes constantly being made for the betterment of our profession, for the benefit of our bar members and for the protection of the public.

I have enjoyed a career in public service for nearly 27 years. Currently, I am the City Attorney for the City of Las Vegas. I became the first African American City Attorney in the City's 119-year history in July 2020. During my time at the Las Vegas City Attorney's Office, I have been the President of the Las Vegas Chapter of the National Bar Association (1996-1999), the first African American President of the Clark County Bar Association (2005), the first African American President of the Clark County Law Foundation (2006) and the First African American President of the State Bar of Nevada (2016-207). Without "change" I could not, and would not have been able to hold those offices.

It is said: "Change is inevitable, growth is optional;" "People are resistant to change;" "Change is difficult;" and "Change takes time." I agree with all of those sentiments. Like me, I'm sure you have all seen changes to the membership of your states' mandatory and local bars, the bar examination, the concern for attorney wellness, the recognition and appreciation of diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI), the call for more civility and the way leaders effectively communicate with bar members. During our next three days together, we will talk about all of those topics and more.

Changes in Lawyer Admissions

The traditional pathway to becoming a lawyer requires graduation from an ABA-accredited law school and taking a bar exam. The National Conference of Bar Examiners (NCBE) provides the Uniform Bar Exam (UBE) for most jurisdictions in the United States. To ensure a continued high-quality and relevant exam—and in response to calls for its reform—the NCBE is in the process of re-building the UBE into the NextGen Bar Exam. Given long-standing equity concerns around standardized testing, however, some jurisdictions are exploring pathways to licensure that would not require the UBE, or even passing a bar exam at all. This panel will provide the latest updates on changes in lawyer admission requirements. What problems are these changes trying to solve and how do we know if they are effective at solving them?

The findings of the 2016 ABA CoLAP and Hazelden Betty Ford Foundation studies of mental health and substance use disorders among lawyers and law students were stark—lawyers and law students experience high rates of depression, substance abuse and chronic stress.
